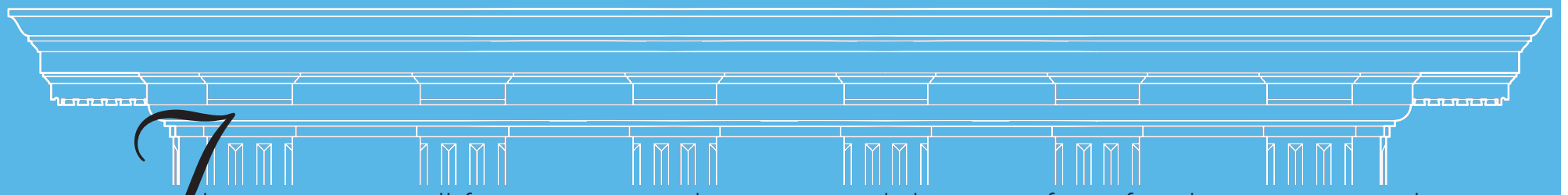


Dean's Symposium
