SEEK IN NYC CELEBRATES 50 YEARS!



In this issue, I want to use this space to point to a very important and exciting anniversary, namely that the Percy Ellis Sutton SEEK Program in the City University of New York is fifty years old this year!

At various CUNY colleges, SEEK Programs have been marking this milestone with celebrations throughout the year. However, these festivities culminated on May 16th when representatives from *all* of the colleges came together with civic leaders, CUNY

SEEK, the brainchild of the late NYS Assemblyman Percy Ellis Sutton (for whom the SEEK Program now takes its full name), was created through legislation encouraged by Sutton and others back in 1966. Its aim was to provide access to CUNY for low-income and academically underprepared students across the city -- to enable them to transform their lives through a college education. Since that time, SEEK Programs, in place at eight senior and three comprehensive CUNY campuses, have enrolled over two hundred thousand students, along with their counterparts in CUNY community colleges (College Discovery).

As the Director of CSI's SEEK Program for the past 27 years, I am humbled to be part of this honorable history. I think about all of the students who have become part of the CSI SEEK family throughout these years, and the many hundreds of students who have achieved degrees. I am reminded of all my colleagues, past and present, who

Founded in 2006, it has distributed over 22 million pairs of shoes, internationally and in the United States.

At last count, over 75 pairs had been collected!
