BUILDING BASIC GRAMMAR SKILLS, ONE STUDENT AT A TIME:

Sentence fragments...run-on sentences...tricky homonyms: these are just some of the writing issues that confound many of our new and continuing SEEK students, even those who are already enrolled in English 111, CSI's course that focuses on honing students' skills for college writing and critical thinking.

Students are frequently referred to tutoring centers for help with the basic building blocks of writing. Also, English is not the primary language for many of our students, causing even greater challenges. SEEK English tutors acknowledge that working on basic skills -- grammar, sentence structure and word usage -- often must be the first order of business.

Enter tutor Beth McNelis who, this semester, was recruited to teach a new workshop series, which ran for three consecutive Wednesdays in April. At one of the sessions, students engaged in fun exercises to distinguish among those pesky "they're, there, and their" choices and many others. Students in other sessions explored how to end a sentence properly or how to correct sentence

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COUNSELING CORNER

WORKING WITH THE CENTER FOR CAREER AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT:

The SEEK Counseling Team always strives to establish working relationships with other CSI offices and services on behalf of our students. One such strong connection over the years has been with the CSI Center for Career and Professional Development. Center staff visit our fall "Freshman Orientation" classes (SKO 100) and guide students through "Focus2," the online career development program which helps students explore their interests. They also offer our students individual appointments for career counseling as well as groups for resume writing. The Center also coorganizes an annual SEEK "Etiquette



Luncheon," a perennial favorite of our students.

This year, the latest addition to the Center's roster of helpful services is the *CSI Career Success Academy (CCSA)* which offers a program of career-building experiences to all first year and transfer CSI students, from day one on campus. Academy students build and reflect on their career-readiness skills through a variety of activities, from volunteerism, club membership, research and academic planning, and other on and off-campus events. They may also apply for internships, attend job fairs and more.

The Academy's Coordinator, Kristi Nielson, reports that at least ten SEEK freshmen participated in the new Academy. One new SEEK student, **Madelin Cruz**, used the Academy to improve her interview skills, complete her resume and LinkedIn profile and explore some internship possibilities. She also got a part-time job as an usher in the Center for the Arts. Madelin, like other Academy participants, received a certificate of completion at the end of the year.

SEEK counselors know that students with clear career goals tend to do better in relation to persistence and retention. SEEK maintains its close partnership with the Career Center with that thought in mind,

and we're grateful for the expertise and caring provided to us each year by Center Director Caryl Watkins and her staff. We hope to carry on this connection for many years to come.


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SEEK SCHOLARS SHINE


"Say yes to opportunities." This is a mantra that the SEEK Program repeats to our students from day one, and this year, fresh-
